The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017.

Reference and administrative information forms part of this report. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the FRS102.

Structure, Governance and Management

Organisation

Bristol Refugee Rights was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 9th January 2006, originally under the name Holding Refugees and Human Rights in Mind, and registered as a charity on 11th November 2008.

The Charity is controlled by its governing document, Memorandum and Articles of Association. Governance of BRR is through a Board of Trustees elected by the membership at the AGM. The Board has final legal authority and is responsible for overseeing the operation of the entire charity and its activities. The Chair, Vice-chair and Treasurer are elected annually and Trustees are elected for a three year term. All new Trustees take part in a formal induction programme and receive regular training.

The Board meets six times in a year. It regularly reviews its structure, the individual and corporate responsibilities of Board members. The Board of Trustees can set up Sub Committees (for example to deal with detailed finances, personnel issues etc.) but all key decisions have to be taken by the full Board and sub committees must report back to them. At the moment there are six sub committees to deal with staffing, finance and fundraising, premises, MCC, health and safety and our Early Years project.

Risk Review

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The trustees recognise the importance of identifying and putting in place effective arrangements for the management of risk. A risk register has been established and has been approved by the Board of Trustees. It is kept under continual review by the Board of Trustees and any changes to risk are reviewed at each Trustees meeting. Financial risks associated with reducing income streams from the government and trust funding has led to development of an income generation strategy which allows for the diversification of funding and activities. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been put in place to diminish the risk the charity faces. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

The Directors

The Board of Directors, who are Trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Objectives and activities

Objects of the Charity

To relieve the needs of asylum seekers and refugees by the provision of information, advice and support.

To preserve and protect the physical and mental health of asylum seekers and their dependants and those granted refugee status and their dependants.

To advance the education of the public in general about the issues relating to refugees and those seeking asylum.

To provide facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life of those persons who have need of such facilities.

To advance the education and training of refugees, asylum seekers and their dependants.

To promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations) by all or any of the following means:

- · relieving need among the victims of human rights abuse
- conducting research into human rights issues
- educating the public about human rights
- raising awareness of human rights issues
- promoting public support for human rights
- promoting respect for human rights among individuals and corporations.

Activities of the Charity

The charity provides a community hub (Welcome Centre) where asylum seekers and refugees can meet and be supported to play a full part in the life of the wider community. Most of our services are delivered by volunteers including around 40% who are asylum seekers or refugees themselves. From the Welcome Centre hub, a number of projects operate, all providing services to BRR's members (asylum seekers and refugees):

- Through the Advocacy and Information desk (AID) and Asylum support project (ASP), we offer one to one support, information and where appropriate advice to our members.
- We run several levels of ESOL and computer classes each week through our BRILL Project. The project also provides members with opportunities for non-classroom based learning and opportunities to learn about life in the UK
- Our Early Years project provides a crèche for children from 4 months to 5 years who
 would otherwise not have access to statutory child care; it provides an opportunity for
 children to learn and play.
- Our VOICE project supports members to volunteer as interpreters within the Welcome Centre and also trains and supports members to speak out about their experiences as asylum seekers and refugees.

Achievements and performance

Bristol Refugee Rights was set up as a voluntary organisation in 2005 to uphold and champion the human rights of asylum seekers and refugees. We provide a place of welcome in Bristol where asylum seekers and refugees can meet and be helped to play a full part in the life of the wider community. We also campaign more widely for the human rights of refugees and asylum seekers. Bristol Refugee Rights aims to deliver a 'user-led' service that addresses the practical and psychological needs as well as the human rights of refugees and asylum seekers by:

- welcoming people into a safe place
- empowering people to achieve an independent and productive life
- enabling social inclusion
- focussing public attention on the need to reform the asylum system to remove the abuses of human rights experienced by our service users.

In 2016/17, BRR was open 3 days a week, 48 weeks of the year and in total received 10,774 visits from members. Over 390 new members were welcomed to our services. Our Community Crèche changed its name to the Early Years Project in recognition of the work that it does to support young children. We held a successful Human Rights Day at City Hall; and members also had the opportunity to influence government policy by taking part in the All Party Parliamentary Group Inquiry into Refugees Welcome. We held 17 classes (English and computing) each week and 42 students moved up an ESOL level. We supported 305 members through AID and 223 through ASP.

During the course of the year we applied through Bristol Impact Fund for funding for services and were successful in obtaining a four year grant towards the costs of our Welcome Centre. We also received notification that our Lloyds Foundation grant has been extended for a further 3 years and were successful in obtaining grants from a number of funders who have not previously funded our work.

Chair's report

These are challenging times for refugee charities as we support our members in an environment where government budgets are cut and organisations compete for money and the public's generosity. There have been great funding successes and a terrific crowdfunding campaign, but we need to keep up our efforts to pay the rent and wages that make BRR possible.

The political environment is difficult. Changes to the rules mean more families face destitution. Members who get status often face poverty when their asylum support ends but they have yet to access new resources. In August 2016, the tragic murder of Kamil Ahmed (a Kurdish asylum seeker from Iraq and longstanding BRR member) brought in to sharp focus the need for services to work together to safeguard the human rights of asylum seekers here in

Bristol. The recent decision to review refugee status after five years confronts members with an anxious future. We are having to deal with a continued stream of unaccompanied children, desperate for help. Other challenges are the housing of members in remoter parts of the area, making our services harder to reach.

Since the last report, Ruth Pickersgill (a hard act to follow) has stepped down as Chair. Long-term trustees Malcom Jenner and Mary Griggs have left. I thank them for their service. Thanks also to Director Beth Wilson and to her maternity cover Katie Hope, as well as our dedicated staff, volunteers and our members, who are the soul of the organisation. Beth has recently led us through a significant move to new offices in the St Paul's Learning Centre. Though new trustees have joined, we continue to look for more, especially people from a refugee background and with skills in accounting and management.

Financial Review

In 2016-17 BRR generated funding of £412,336 and spent £377,088. Most of our funding came from trusts, foundations, and Bristol City Council, while £69,134 of our funding came from individual donors, an increase on the £39,521 raised last year. All funding received has been vital in ensuring that we can continue to be here for our members, and we would like to thank all donors and funders for supporting us.

Public benefit

The Trustees have complied with their duty under the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Reserves Policy

In 2009 the Trustees agreed that we should keep 3 months of expected expenditure in free reserves, to be increased to 6 months of expected expenditure when feasible at a future date. On 8th March 2011 the Trustees reviewed this policy, taking into account the lower risk arising from much of our income being in the form of grants committed for 2, 3, or 4 years at a time, with different start dates during the year. It was then agreed that we should aim to hold 15 per cent of expected annual expenditure in free reserves, with the actual amount being reviewed each year. In September 2016, the Trustees reviewed the policy and decided that we should aim to hold 2 months of expected future expenditure rather than 15 per cent.

The budgeted expenditure for 2017/18 is £362,260 and therefore the target is £60,377 in general funds. Our general funds, also our free reserves, at the end of March 2017 are £104,953 which is 42% above the target.

Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

Some income and expenditure for the registered charity Bristol Hospitality Network (charity number 1138498) is being managed by Bristol Refugee Rights. Funds received and expenditure spent on behalf of BHN are not recognised in the charity's accounts.

During the year £3,160 was received and £4,721 was expended out of funds held on behalf of Bristol Hospitality Network. At the end of the year the charity held £2,976 within the bank for Bristol Hospitality Network. Please refer to note 13 for detail.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

The Trustees are required to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The Financial Statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these Financial Statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent:
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the Financial Statements, and
- prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Small company provisions

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

I report on the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 March 2017, which are set out on pages 8 to 18.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and the seeking of explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

In the year there was a changeover in accounting staff that led to a lack of recording of petty cash expenditure items. Retrospectively the charity has sought to identify the expenditure and explain the difference including interviewing those managing the funds at the time. Further controls have been put in place by the new accounting staff, however the difference has not been fully explained and £1,453 of expenditure is unidentified as disclosed in note 5.

In connection with my examination, no matter other than the above has come to my attention:

- which gives me reasonable cause to believe that, in any material respect, the requirements:
 - (a) to keep accounting records in accordance with section 386 of the Companies Act 2006, and
 - (b) to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records, comply with the accounting requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and with the methods and principles of the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities have not been met, or
- to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.

1 Accounting policies

a) The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), and with the 'small companies' provisions of the Companies Act 2006. In adopting SORP FRS102 some expenditure items were reclassified in the SOFA, additionally due to including a holiday wage accrual per the SORP, net income in the prior year and brought forward fund balances were restated. See note 16 for further details.

The charity is a public benefit entity as defined under FRS102.

There are no material uncertainties affecting the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern.

- b) Income from donations is included in income when these are receivable, except as follows:
 - i) When donors specify that donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
 - ii) When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred until the pre-conditions have been met.
- c) Expenditure is recognised in the period in which it is incurred. Expenditure includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.
- d) Most expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities, and has been included in those cost categories. Support cost have been allocated 100% towards the charitable activities of the charity. Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examiner's fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity. Governance costs are included within charitable activity costs.
- e) Rentals applicable to operating lease agreements where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.
- f) Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.
- g) Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
- h) Although no assets were held at the year-end, if capitalised, assets would be held at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets costing less than £800 are not capitalised.

14 Trustee transactions

No trustees received any remuneration in either the 2017 or 2016 financial years. Three trustees (2016: four) were reimbursed for out of pocket travel expenses during the year totalling £82 (2016: £77).

Aggregate donations from trustees, key management personnel and related parties were £2,332 (2016: £1,114).

15 Company limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and as such has no issued share capital. In the event of the company being wound up the liability of the members is limited to £1 each.

16 Prior-year adjustments

In the year it was determined that the correct classification of grant income is within 'Donations' rather than 'Charitable activity' income. This adjustment increases donation income, reducing charitable activity income by £293,153 - there was no effect on net income or reserves.

Similarly governance and other support costs totalling £8,170 were reclassified from 'Other' costs to 'Charitable activity' costs with no change to net income or reserves.

In adopting FRS102 SORP a holiday pay accrual was introduced totalling £4,241 in the current year and £3,620 in the prior year. This increased prior year wage costs within charitable activities by £3,620 (including disclosure notes), reducing net income by the same amount. Several fund balances, both restricted and unrestricted at 1 April 2016 were affected. Restricted funds brought forward were reduced by £2,079 in total, unrestricted funds brought forward were reduced by £1,541. This reduction explains the restated negative brought forward position of several restricted funds however these have been corrected by the year-end.

There were two funds - the BRR Sue Njie Hardship Fund and the BRR LARA Fund that were treated as designated funds in the prior year. A review identified these to be restricted funds rather than designated funds. As such a prior year adjustment for £4,134 in total has moved these brought forward fund balances from designated to restricted funds. This has been carried out as a transfer in the comparative SOFA.

One restricted fund in the prior year - the Syrian Resettlement Fund - was found upon review to have been comprised of unrestricted funds. The charity had received remuneration for charitable services carried out rather than restricted donations. As such, a prior year adjustment reducing the brought forward restricted fund position, increasing the brought forward general fund position by £9,648 has been carried out.
